Deadlines & Reminders

4-H Financial Audit Due November 1

The annual audit is required for all non-appropriated funds generated for Extension programs. This includes funds raised/collected by 4-H clubs, project clubs, affiliated groups, etc. The Annual Financial Report document can be found on the Leader Resources page at <u>www.johnson.k-state.edu/4-h/project-club-resources/</u>. Every club/group who has an EIN number issued by the IRS is asked to have a Financial Review Committee review the club financial records annually. Members of this committee should NOT be family members of the treasurer or signatories on the account. The committee should be composed of two 4-H members and two adult volunteers. This information is due to the Extension office by November 1, 2020. A reminder that the Treasurer's Book MUST be submitted from every group with an EIN. Contact Ami with questions.

Advice from Mr. and Ms. 4-H

Question: What 4-H projects have been the most meaningful to you during your 4-H career and why?

Mr. 4-H, Jayden Brethour: The three 4-H projects that have had the largest impact on me are



Energy Management, Public Speaking, and Foods. I started being involved in the Energy Management project my first year in 4-H and have loved it since then. I learned a lot about all types of electricity related projects, from how to rewire a lamp to how to make a moisture sensor. My father and grandpa helped me learn how to test voltage, solder, and everything between. I have found this project helps you grow in critical thinking when you have to find solutions for a problem you are facing. Public Speaking is something that I have grown in because of 4-H. It has

helped me be able to articulate my views with others. Because of the skills I learned, I am now able to powerfully present talks to teachers and peers. These skills are useful, regardless of your career plan.

The Foods project is one of my newer projects, but I have quickly grown to love it. Who wouldn't love a project that results in getting cookies, cakes, pies, and other wonderful food? Much like Public Speaking, the skills that you gain are useful for the rest of your life.

Regardless of which project you find most meaningful, I urge you to enthusiastically pursue it.

YQCA Requirements

What is YQCA? Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal wellbeing, and character development, through age-appropriate educational curriculum for ages 7-21. This program is an annual certification that grows with the youth, so the learning modules are different every year. **Who needs to be certified?**

<u>Johnson County Fair Exhibitors</u>: All youth age 7 and older exhibiting in the beef, goat, sheep and/ or swine project must be YQCA certified by May 1 of the current year in order to exhibit at the fair. <u>Exhibitors at State Livestock Shows</u>: All youth age 8 and older who will be exhibiting market or breeding animals in the Kansas State Fair Grand Drive or Kansas Junior Livestock Show (KJLS) are required to obtain certification.

How do I get certified? Certification can be done by taking a minimum one-hour in-person training or an online training. Both types of trainings are registered for and paid for by going to <u>www.YQCA.org</u> and logging into the system through 4-H Online using your current login information. All registration and payment is handled through the YQCA website and must be done before attending either type of training. The online training is \$12 per youth and the in-person training is \$3 per youth. Dates for in-person trainings in Johnson County will be announced soon. **Please remember to print your YQCA certificate to bring to county Fair.** For more information visit <u>www.johnson.k-state.edu/4-h/events-programs/livestock.html</u>. International Opportunities

Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange (CBYX) Program

The Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange (CBYX) Program is an exciting cultural exchange and fully funded scholarship opportunity for high school students. The Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE) administers CBYX on behalf of the U.S. Department of State. The CIEE is a nonprofit organization with a mission to help people gain understanding, acquire knowledge and develop skills for living in a globally interdependent and culturally diverse world.

The CBYX annually offers 250 young Americans the opportunity to live with a host family and attend high school in Germany for an academic year.

⇒ Academic merit, as well as motivation, curiosity and flexibility are key components to a competitive application.

⇒ Previous German language experience is not required. Participants become fluent in German. CIEE selects 100 students from diverse cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds from across 18 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico to become CBYX youth ambassadors. Students who are U.S. Citizens born between February 1, 2003 and August 1, 2006 with a GPA of 2.5 or higher are eligible to apply. 48 Hours of 4-H Challenge Embraced

Martin Luther King Jr. is quoted as saying, "Everybody can be great, because anybody can serve." The Kansas 4-H Youth Leadership Council agrees with Dr. King which is why they challenged 4-H club members across the State of Kansas to come together to serve a total of at least 2,000 volunteer service hours during the course of 2 days, October 10-11, 2020. 2021 Enrollment in New 4-H Online System

The new 4-H Online system opened October 1 for families to re-enroll current 4-H members and enroll new 4-H members. The new website for 4-H Online is <u>http://v2.4honline.com</u>. We ask that all current 4-H members be re-enrolled by November 1, 2020.

New enrollment guides for families and volunteers are posted on our 4-H website at <u>www.johnson.k-state.edu/4-h/forms-resources/</u>. As a reminder the \$15 program fee will be paid at the time of enrollment within 4-H Online. (Adult volunteers and Cloverbuds will not be charged the fee.) Project Leaders and Volunteers must be Registered Volunteers

Adults providing supervision to youth at a 4-H program; making decisions on behalf of the 4-H program; having access to private data of 4-H members or volunteers; and/or handling funds as part of 4-H must complete the volunteer screening process, be accepted, and enrolled as a Kansas 4-H volunteer.

Volunteer applications and renewals are completed through 4-H Online. We ask that all current volunteers complete their renewal by November 1. If a volunteer has not completed the renewal process in 4-H Online for the 2020-2021 year, they should not be volunteering for your club. Once the renewal process has been completed in 4-H Online and their profile is "Active" they may resume their volunteer duties.

Youth under the age of 18 do not need to complete the volunteer screening process. (There are a few exceptions such as camp counselors.)
